

From the Principal

The last few weeks have seen Bracken Ridge State High celebrate and acknowledge students striving to accomplish.

It was a proud moment for parents and school staff to induct our school leaders for 2024. Congratulations to Madison and Madeline our new School Captains and to our other Year 12 captains, school leaders, house captains, vice captains, and student council representatives.

The Living Deadly Mob BBQ on Wednesday saw parents, staff, students, regional office staff and community organisations come together to recognise the successes of our students. Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students have received their Brack-N-Deadly certificates and badges - Deadly Attender for their 2023 attendance and Deadly Brain to celebrate the semester two 2023 academic results.

Congratulations to our 2024 QATSIF recipients – Mia Fry, Jaydin Maher, Maggie Vincombe, and Hayden Wise. These students were recognised at our recent leader induction ceremony and were presented with their certificates at the QATSIS ceremony at ACU – Banyo. QATSIF was created to give Queensland's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families increased educational choices and life opportunities. The scholarship worth \$2000 supports students who complete year 11 and 12. Year 10 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students in 2024 that have 85% attendance and passing their academic studies are eligible to apply in term three.

School representative sport has started with many trials taking place this term. Make sure your child reads the list at the HPE staffroom door in the MPSC and registers their intention to trial. The permission forms are then sent to each student online before they can participate. We wish your child success in their efforts to gain selection.

The online NAPLAN test takes place between Wednesday 13 March and Monday 25 March 2024. Students will attend normal classes for at least half the day with NAPLAN occurring in 1-2 sessions only. The NAPLAN program aims is to provide parents/carers, students and schools with information relating to performance in diagnostic tests in reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy.

Aunty Diana Price – Teacher Aide, provides cultural and classroom support for our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students. Sarah Little is our Youth Support Coordinator – 2 days providing students links to external agencies. Regionally we work with our Transitions Pathways Officer – Tracey Wallace when students are not having success in year 11 and 12 or who are seeking alternative pathways. Our ESS team includes, HOSES, teachers, Literacy and Numeracy support and teacher aides who provide students with support for learning difficulties and disabilities.

EXAM BLOCK

In Week 6 and 7, Year 11 and 12 students will be engaging in four (4) days of block exams, and the current version of the timetable is attached.

Page 1 outlines the processes for attending the exam block, and students will be taken through the exam timetable as well during Year Level Assembly and Form Classes to ensure the processes are understood. The key messages to be aware of during block exams is:

- Students will need to attend their regularly timetabled classes as show on the schedule in white
- Regularly timetabled classes will not be delivered on the 4 days of block exams – Thursday, Friday, Monday, Tuesday
- Student must attend their scheduled session at the day, time and location as seen on the schedule
- Once students have completed their session, they may leave the school grounds (unless they have an afternoon session)
- Students who have an afternoon session only arrive before the start of their session (unless they would like to study in the library prior)
- Not all subjects studied by Year 11 and 12 students will be on this timetable
- Other subjects will have assessment that will fall outside of the exam block period, and students should be using their time to ensure they meet the assessment requirements for all their subjects, not just those appearing on the exam timetable
- Students enrolled in certificate courses will be required to attend if requested by their classroom teacher as they are not up to date. This means students who are up to date in class as identified by their teacher will not be required to attend the session.
- VET Certificate course students will be contacted by their teacher by next Tuesday morning to notify them of this requirement.

FAQ's

What should my child do on those days that they are not required to attend school?

Students should review their assessment calendar and ensure they are prepared for any assessment that is due after the exam block period. Having a large block of time can support students to focus on one assessment task at a time, and creates sustained blocks of time for research, writing and editing. Students who are at TAFE or traineeship with online

modules to complete should also focus on completing these modules, so that they are keeping up with the workload of their additional training.

My child completes a traineeship – can they complete additional hours?

If your child completes work placement as part of their traineeship, they can request to complete hours on days that they do not have exams to complete. However, they first need to check in with Diane Heinze our Industry Liaison Officer to discuss this option and ensure the workplace can accommodate the student for additional days. I have included Diane's email address so you can reach out to her via email as well.

NAPLAN TESTING

In 2023, the NAPLAN program was brought forward by the Federal Government to Term 1, instead of Term 2. The aim of conducting the test in term 1 each year is to provide parents/carers, students and schools with information relating to performance in diagnostic tests in reading, writing, conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. Bringing the test forward enables earlier access to student data, to support learning.

Like last year, NAPLAN will be conducted online and involves four tailored tests that adapt to student responses, providing better assessment and more precise results. There is a nine (9) day (Wednesday 13 March - Monday 25 March 2024) testing window and preparations are currently under way to ensure Bracken Ridge State High School is well prepared for this to occur. NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students have already learnt through the school curriculum. Our teachers, in class, are providing many opportunities in the lead-up to ensure that the students will be confident in their approach to these tests.

One of the main benefits of NAPLAN online is that it uses tailored (or adaptive) testing. This means that students receive questions better suited to their abilities, so they can show what they know and can do. Tailored tests provide more precise results. Students should not be concerned if they think that the questions are more difficult than expected or they have previously experienced – this may simply mean that they are taking a more challenging but more appropriate pathway. This tailored testing approach means that a wider range of student abilities can be tested (compared with the paper approach, where all students answer exactly the same questions). Feedback from students is that they find the online test more engaging.

On its own, NAPLAN is not a test that can be studied for and students are not expected to do so. NAPLAN is just one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process – it does not replace ongoing assessments made by teachers about student performance; however, students and parents may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.

In addition to normal classroom activities, we will undertake some targeted activities to assist our students becoming familiar with test procedures and rules navigating the online platform.

Year 7 students will be using their own devices for NAPLAN and Year 9 students will be using our desktop devices.


To provide support and guidance with the online platform, all students have and will be involved in practice activities on the following days:

- Monday 4 March
- Monday 11 March

These activities will familiarise students with online tools they can use as well as enhancing their ICT skills. Please ensure students have full charged laptop (and bring their charger) for the practice test and NAPLAN tests as well as the following stationary in a clear clip seal bag:

- Lead pencil/pens
- Pencil sharpener
- Eraser

NAPLAN tests are constructed to give students an opportunity to demonstrate skills they have learnt over time through the school curriculum, and NAPLAN practice test and test days should be treated as just another routine event on the school calendar. The best way you can help your child prepare for NAPLAN is to reassure them that NAPLAN tests are just one part of their school program, and to advise them to simply do the best they can on the day.

Middle School News

Year 9

We welcome year 9 students to the Middle School. The Middle School revolves around the philosophies of transition, future focus and personal growth. Throughout year 9 we will be exploring student's potential particularly in the 'Strive to Accomplish' (STA) program. This term students are learning about how they, as individuals, approach social interactions and personal wellbeing, and resilience. After this unit we will focus on their potential as learners preparing them for subject selection and senior learning. The significant focus this semester is transitioning students into middle school by encouraging them to be more independent in the studies, organization and social interactions.

Year 10

It will be an exciting term for Year 10 with the majority of student receiving laptops; these are certainly a positive addition to their learning. For students borrowing a day loan computer from the Resource Centre a reminder that this must be done before form class or they will not be issued one. This term students will be learning during their 'Strive to Accomplish' (STA) lessons about: how to maximise the use of their laptop, creating and sending appropriate emails, utilizing their calendar for assessment date reminders, using an interactive weekly planner; these are just a few of the topics that will be covered.

Year 10 is an important year as students start to formulate their plan for senior school. In term three students will complete their Senior Education and Learning Plan (SET P) selecting subjects that match their future pathway. Results from semester two Year 9 and semester one Year 10 will determine entry into some subjects in Year 11 and 12 so it is very important that students are focused on their studies and track their academic achievement. Students will be working on this during their STA lessons.

At Bracken Ridge SHS students in Year 10 are not permitted to take on student-based traineeships or apprenticeships unless the required work placement hours occur outside of school hours. Students are still completing compulsory studies under the Australian Curriculum and their results impact their choice of subjects in Year 11 and 12. Once students enter the post compulsory stage of their schooling (Year 11 and 12) they are able to select the traineeship/apprenticeship as one of their subjects; allowing them to have tutorial lessons to catch up on work missed. This flexibility and support are not available during the compulsory years of schooling.

Deagon Deviation, batter slope restoration works

The Department of Transport and Main Roads (TMR) would like to advise that batter slope flood repair works will be carried out at two sites along the Deagon Deviation southbound from late February to early April 2024 as per the map below.

Works will include:



Site 1

- Removal of fallen debris
- Installation of grouted rock pitching at the toe of the pedestrian bridge abutment.

Site 2

- · Removal of fallen debris and vegetation.
- Installation of a hydromulch-bonded fibre matrix treatment to control erosion and promote growth.
- Trees and other vegetation located within the treatment area and slope will be removed as part of the restoration works.

Timing



- Works will commence late February and be completed by early April 2024. construction and weather conditions permitting.
- Typical construction hours will be from 6:30pm to 4:30am, Sunday to Thursday.
- Night works are required for road user safety, and to avoid what would otherwise be extensive traffic queuing and distruption to the road network.
- While majority of the works will be undertaken at night, some Saturday or out of hours works may be required.

Expected impacts



- . Traffic changes will be in effect, including partial road shoulder closures. temporary speed reductions and short-term traffic disruptions.
- · Please allow extra time when planning your travel and follow the directions of roadside signage and traffic controllers.
- Nearby residents and businesses can expect to experience short term impacts including increased noise, dust and odour during the works.

Upon completion, TMR officers will continue to review the site for up to three months. During this time, TMR will assess the work undertaken for longevity and quality. In some cases TMR may need to request further work at the location to rectify any defects.

School zone safety - advice for motorists, parents and carers

With school back for 2024, we need to keep safety top-of-mind when travelling through active school zones and around our school community.

School zone times have been standardised in Queensland to help motorists remember when to slow down. The standard operating times for most school zones in Queensland are 7–9am and 2–4pm, with some operating all day between 7am-4pm.

Speeding remains a significant concern, contributing to fatalities and injuries, and police will be on the lookout for speeding motorists. Keeping below the signed speed limit in school zones helps keep everyone safe. This simple adjustment may have minimal impact on travel time but has the potential to significantly contribute to saving lives.

Children's crossings are identified by children's crossing flags, displayed near crossings before and

When the crossing is supervised, you, as a motorist, must.

- Wait until all pedestrians, bicycle riders, or personal mobility device riders have crossed the
- road and the crossing supervisor has returned to the footpath Abide by the direction given by the School Crossing Supervisor.

Please keep our children safe by staying alert, slowing down and obeying our school crossing supervisors who are there to help kids cross the road safety.

You can also help-children become more road safety aware by

- Showing them how to look for vehicles corning in and out of driveways and discourage them from playing behind parked cars, or with toys or bells when walking to school. Ensuing your child knows the safest route to and from school. This is usually the way with the least traffic and the fewest reads to cross and teach your child to always walk on footpaths. Showing your child how to cross at traffic lights when the green walk' sign is showing at pedestrian crossings when vehicles have stopped and at supervised school crossings when the supervised school crossings when the supervised school walk and the supervised school or safe to do so.

 Accompanying children when walking or riding to school until they are old enough to understand mad safety (usually around 10 years or older).

 Teaching your child if they catch the bus to never cross in front of or behind a bus, wait until the bus goes before crossing the road.

 Making sure wheeled devices (bicycle, scooter, skateboard, or rollerblades) used to travel to school are well maintained and that the appropriate protective and safety gear (for example, helmet, visible clothing, knee and elbow pads) are used.
