NEXT STEP - 2024 Post-School Destinations

This is a summary of post-school destinations of Year 12 2023 students from Bracken Ridge State High School that completed the Next Step survey. A key part of our vision is supporting our students to achieve their pathway for success. We know our students all have different needs and we proud ourselves on our work with the student and their families to help students achieve their dreams.



77.5% response rate

62 out of 80 Year 12 completers from this school responded to the 2024 survey. Results may not be representative of all Year 12 completers at this school.

Post-school destinations



In 2024, 90.3% of Year 12 completers from Bracken Ridge State High School were engaged in education, training or employment in the year after they completed school.





Of the 62 respondents, 51.6% continued in education and training. The most common study destination was bachelor degree.



A further 38.7% transitioned directly into paid employment only.

All Year 12 completers were assigned to a *main destination*. Respondents who were both studying and working are reported as being in education or training, including apprentices and trainees.



It is a group being held on Wednes-




It is a safe place for young people to hang out at lunch, chat with their peers as well as Alec and myself and eventually work on a school improvement project (TBD).

Bracken Ridge SHS Flexi Learning Program



Bracken Ridge State High School acknowledges that some students experience significant challenges at various junctures in their schooling and for most remaining at school provides their best chance of success.

The Flexi Learning Program responds to adolescent development and sets high expectations for achieving the best outcomes possible. The space is staffed by dedicated teachers that help shape innovative practices to provide students with uninterrupted access to the Australian curriculum and high-quality teaching. This core teacher model aims to establish relationships with students, deepen connections with families, foster community engagement and build a strong foundation for learning.

The six-month Flexi Learning Program:

- Supports students in enhancing their potential by increasing their learning engagement and independence
- Supports student learning through individualised approaches
- Encourages students to take risks with their learning and improve learning outcomes
- Provides a safe learning environment to enable students to take learning risks
- Collectively works to enhance student's confidence, social-emotional connectedness and wellbeing.

Students will be identified by a team of dedicated staff who will analyse student data (academic outcomes including behaviour and effort, engagement and attendance) to consider participation in the program. Students will be invited to attend the program, and an information session will occur to outline the program to parent/carers.

The Flexi Learning Program will assist students to re-engage, build confidence in their own ability and improve their learning endurance. The basis of the program is to build on solid academic foundations to prepare for the years ahead. This is complimented by a well-established transition program which ensures each student feels valued and supported. The program will track student progress, observe student behaviour and engagement in classes, and provide students with self-regulation skills, attitudes and strategies to achieve individual goals for improvement.

Students will participate in learning tasks and assessments to meet the requirements of the Australian Curriculum. The academic program is designed to build learning resilience, with confidence and endurance through Social Sciences and Science expectations. Additional social and emotional programs will allow students to improve critical and creative thinking, personal and social capability and ethical and intercultural understanding. Students will continue to attend all other timetabled classes.

YEAR 10 EXAM BLOCK


In Week 8 of Term 4, a five-day block exam period will be occurring for the Year 10 cohort **starting Monday 18 November, concluding Friday 22 November.**

Please take the time to discuss with your child the exam schedule and times for attending school so any transport arrangements can be organised.

Key information about exam block:

- Students are required to arrive at the exam location 10 minutes before each session begins 8:50 am and 11:50 am.
- Attendance is mandatory for all required sessions.
- There is no expectation for students to attend school from Monday to Friday outside of scheduled examination sessions. Attendance records will be updated to reflect this.
- There is no expectation for students to attend school from Monday to Friday outside of scheduled examination sessions. Attendance records will be updated to reflect this.
- Absences from exams must be supported by a medical certificate and a missed examination form.
 Additionally, please notify the school of any expected absences prior to the exam date.
- For any catch-up sessions to complete outstanding assessments, notification emails will be sent to both the student and parent/caregiver requiring attendance.
- Once exams are completed, students are to either leave the school grounds or sign in at the Resource Centre for quiet individual study.
- Year 10 students are required to read the attached document carefully to ensure they are aware of the expectations to successful complete the exam period. Students should develop a study plan to ensure they are prepared to perform to the best of their ability.

Students who travel on Thompson Bus Services are now able to pay for their travel using Smart Ticketing Visa, Mastercard and American Express contactless credit or debit cards, smartphones, smart watches and other smart devices, if they have access to them.

To use Smart Ticketing successfully, students need to prepare early, take their card out of their wallet or case, or prepare their smart device ready to tap. They must also tap on and tap off at the end of their journey using the same card or device.

FAQs

1. Can I use Smart Ticketing to transfer between services?

Yes, you can transfer between services using Smart Ticketing if it is enabled on that service. When transferring between services, remember to tap on and tap off using the same payment method for every trip on your journey, so your fare is calculated correctly. If you are transferring to a SEQ bus other than a Caboolture Bus Lines, Kinetic Sunshine Coast, or Hornibrook Bus Lines operated service, please continue to use your *go* card at this time.

2. How do I know if I have tapped on correctly?

If a customer taps on correctly at a validator, they will see a "tick" on the screen. If a customer doesn't tap on correctly at a validator, they will see a "cross" instead. Customers must tap on at the start of their journey and tap off at the end of their journey with the same card or device, the same way that customers do with a *go* card.

3. Can I use eftpos or prepaid cards?

No. Eftpos or prepaid cards are not accepted with Smart Ticketing. Smart Ticketing payment methods are contactless Visa, Mastercard or American Express debit or credit cards, including cards in the digital wallet of your smartphone, smart watch or other smart devices.

4. Can I still use my go card on Smart Ticketing equipment?

Yes, customers can still use their go card on Smart Ticketing equipment.

Smart Ticketing trials are being progressively activated for travel on all remaining Queensland buses and Southern Moreton Bay Island ferries, operator-by-operator in the coming months. To learn more about Smart Ticketing, visit translink.com.au/smartticketing
